Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

Do you like your doctor? I suspect that many people will respond "yes" to that question. And in our heart of hearts we know that the positive answer is about more than benevolent acquaintance. A person to whom we look to as a helper and advisor when we're ill receives our respect. And the trust that goes with that respect, is part of the healing process for which we're looking. This isn't just about amiable relationships, it's also about creating confidence towards healing. For many of us liking is a key part of a restorative relationship.

I suppose this is part of what my Grandma called 'a good bedside manner.' Others might be technically very proficient, but when it came to serious ill-health, she always sought the doctor with a 'good bedside manner.' This made palatable things that were painful – emotionally as well as physically. The liked doctor could even persuade her into the care of the technically very proficient but acerbic colleague, such was likeability's power.

Saint Luke, the Gospel writer, whose feast we mark today, was a doctor. We can imagine Paul when writing his second letter to Timothy being in prison and anticipating the nearness of his execution. Although he remains confident in God, emotionally he feels abandoned, isolated, and depressed. Those are the circumstances in which he writes, 'Only Luke is with me.' And yet he sends for

Timothy and Mark; evidently seeing in their companionship something of hope in his painful circumstances. Is it too fanciful to suggest that it is Luke, 'the beloved physician,' who has encouraged Paul so that he might see the hopeful possibility? Might not likeability's power have operated for him as it does for us?

Likeable Luke, I'm sure, is the author of the account of Jesus sending out the seventy. It is not incidental to the story that his instructions to them includes giving a greeting of peace. 'Peace' is a word Jesus used a lot and it was his first gift to his followers after his resurrection.

That little word means so much more than an absence of strife. Indeed, its Hebrew equivalent – shalom – makes plain that its meaning stretches to social and individual wellbeing. In the Hebrew scriptures it is sometimes translated as 'health' – an understanding that fits well with our celebration of Luke, the beloved physician. It speaks of peace/well-being in the widest possible of senses—between nations and communities as well as in families, between individuals, and within the heart and soul of any particular person.

God's peace, in that widest of senses, is something to receive and ponder on in our own troubled times. Let that be part of likeable Luke's gift to us, as it was to Saint Paul.
