

25th October 2020 Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

One of the features of the pandemic which continues to have such a profound impact on our lives, is that all of us are potentially affected. From the wealthiest to the poorest, from distant countries in the Far East, to great nations like the United States. From northernmost Scotland, to the far western reach of Anglesey. Coronavirus can infect anyone, and at the moment we have little idea who would suffer worst from it. But there is an even greater pandemic which the world has lived for so long that we almost do not pay attention. That is an infection which every single human being suffers from, from which there is no vaccine, and that is called sin.

The only solution comes in the shape of a cross, the one on which Christ died to pay the penalty for all sin for all time. Until sin is brought to the foot of the cross, it continues to multiply, it continues to infect. The only sanitising we can do to prevent the pandemic of sin taking further hold, is to come before the cross and place all our wrongdoings there, in penitence and faith, and in order to begin to know God's healing peace working in our lives.

On this Bible Sunday, we hear once more the beautiful words in S.Paul's letter to the Colossians encouraging us to be clothed in Christ, and in His Love, that lies at the heart of the whole Gospel. It is love for the world that sent Jesus to live among us, and to die on the cross for our sakes. It is because of that perfect sacrifice that we are enabled to wrap ourselves up in Christ. Who commands us to love God and love our neighbour as

ourselves, which is demonstrated in those Christ-like qualities of compassion, kindness, humility, meekness and patience, and supremely, love. Such words as these need time to soak in and allow to dwell in our hearts, or in the words of the Collect for this day, to 'read, mark, learn and inwardly digest them'. If we are to do that fully, then not only the words we say, or the way we behave in public, but also the way we are in private, and the innermost thoughts of our hearts, are to be reflecting the same Christ-like qualities.

Sadly, our world is so full of sin, not least our own lives, that we find it hard to live up to those words in Colossians. I write this just after a very damning report into the abuses by the late Victor Whitsey, former Bishop of Chester, by Judge Pearl, was published (see notices for details). It makes very painful reading indeed. How anybody is able to abuse others in such ways is hard to fathom, but in a church leader this shocks more. And the report also describes the inadequate responses made by the church in the subsequent years. 'Betrayal of Trust' is a very apt title. It appals me profoundly. Let me quote from a letter written to all clergy on the subject, by the latest Bishop of Chester, +Mark:

We strive ... not to argue, simply repent ... not to be defensive, simply love ... not to be experts, simply faithful foot-washing servants.

Thus, in Christ's name we will listen, repent, pray, weep, care, and serve. We will provide loving hospitality, we will defend the weak; we will strive to be agents of peace, mercy, grace, and love. Amen. Tina Upton
