Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

We Brits seem to be particularly attuned to rudeness. Generally, we simply hate it. A certain courteousness comes almost naturally to us and we are easily affronted if that's ignored. Perhaps that's part of the reason why in current circumstances we quietly walk around the unmasked.

In today's Gospel reading Philip's attempt to introduce his friend, Nathanael, to Jesus is met with a rude retort. "Can anything good come out of Nazareth?" says Nathanael dismissively. Is there something here of local rivalries and antagonisms? It's less than 30 miles from Nathanael's hometown of Bethsaida to Nazareth, but there's obviously no love lost!

Being rude about the place comes naturally to Nathanael. I've heard similar remarks about neighbouring communities locally. I'm sure you know why there are only three faces on the Town Hall clock! Nathanael is sceptical and suspicious of the place and its people; scoffing comes readily to him. The place so near and yet so far. Suspicion, scepticism and scoffing – those are the measures of Nathanael's attitude.

Suspicion, scepticism and scoffing might also be the words for how many people see the churches nowadays. Yes, there are many instances of church folks striving to help their neighbours in all sorts of ways, and appreciated as they are, the church as church is scoffed at. It comes easily to most people to be rude about the church. Many, many people are sceptical about what the church is about. Not because they are sceptical

necessarily about God (although it seems more and more are), but because they don't see the need for all this worship. They see what we do as a nonsense, quite literally. It doesn't make sense to them.

But because the idea of worship comes hard to many doesn't mean that faith amounts to foolish credulity. Surely Christians are hardheaded realists when it comes to human experience. That's one of the things Nathanael's scepticism reassures us about. He doesn't accept news of the Messiah with naïve gullibility. The tensions are recognised. His outlook on life will be radically challenged by Jesus, but first the news must become part of his pre-existing way of thinking.

The gospel is always radically new; a turning about of our thoughts and a turning around of the way things are, but that begins in an honest acknowledgment of the way things are currently. Faith sees the world differently, but it is never indifferent to the way the world is. We are blessed by God with an alternative reality.

I am sure it is no coincidence that the name Nathanael literally means 'gift of God.' Nathanael's encounter with Christ begins in an all-to understandable cynicism, but he will come to see the glories of heaven in the person of Jesus. We too are to live in that alternative reality, that vision gifted to us by God, even when it comes hard.
